- 1. *This is My Story* A multi-session residency for 6th graders that focuses on self-awareness and explores the topics of personal strengths and identity, self-confidence, role models, personal values, worldview, core emotions, and emotion management
- 2. *This is Our Story* A multi-session residency for 7th graders that focuses on self and others and explores the topics of friendship, inclusion and exclusion, understanding differences, empathy, community and connection, teamwork, problem-solving, bullying, and becoming an ally.
- 3. *This is My Future* A multi-session residency for 8th graders that focuses on the power of mindsets, self-motivation and self-discipline, organization skills, creative visioning, setting goals, and creating a life plan.

New Special Exhibition October 25, 2023 – April 28, 2024

The Girl in the Diary: Searching for Rywka from the Lodz Ghetto

This deeply moving exhibit comes to the Maltz Museum from Galicia Jewish Museum in Kraków, Poland. In 1945, a diary was found in the ashes of a destroyed crematorium in the liberated Auschwitz-Birkenau Camp. Written by a 14-year-old Jewish girl named Rywka Lipszyc who never loses hope or her faith, the diary documents her life, loss of siblings and parents in the Łódz Ghetto between October 1943 and April 1944. With no known photos of Rywka, commentary from historians, doctors, psychologists, and rabbis in this deeply moving exhibition helps to blend original artifacts and candid photographs of others' lives in the ghetto to help audiences understand the experiences Rywka describes in her diary. *The Girl in the Diary* is a tribute to the life of a child who will not be forgotten.



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BlueWater Chamber Orchestra

BlueWater Chamber Orchestra is committed to expanding the boundaries of what a chamber orchestra can be. Under the leadership of Artistic Director Daniel Meyer, we're beginning a new era of lively creative performance and educational experiences, reaching out to listeners via neighborhood-based programs that bring classical music directly to their doors. For the coming year we offer these programs:

"Peter and the Wolf" — We think you and your Grade K-6 students will enjoy this 40-minute program, guided by our Narrator and the BlueWater Chamber Orchestra Woodwind Quintet: flute, oboe, clarinet, bassoon, and horn. Each

presentation can serve up to 300 students. Prokofiev's beloved music and story is specially arranged for chamber ensemble. Students will learn about the different instruments of the woodwind family and how the timbre of musical instruments enhance the telling of a story.

"Green Eggs and Ham" Opera — This fun-filled 35 minute program works well for up to 500 K-Grade 6 students per performance. The beloved book by Dr. Seuss is sung as an opera, with two singers accompanied by an eight piece chamber ensemble. Students learn about the relationship of words and music as well as literature and music. Performers explain what an opera is and how instrumentalists and singers work together to make the music alive.

In "**Come Play with the String Quartet**" the BlueWater String Quartet - 2 violins, viola, cello - introduces students to the excitement of strings and ensemble playing. This 40-minute program works well for up to 300 K-Grade 6 students. It helps them learn about the different instruments in the string family, musical dynamics, moods in music, and composers. Students will also learn how to conduct a group, how an ensemble conducts itself, and get a chance to join in and play violin with the quartet!

"Exploration CLE" is an hour-long video concert that celebrates what makes Cleveland so special. Featuring the full BlueWater Chamber Orchestra, this virtual program is targeted for Grades 3-6. From our fantastic museums, natural beauty, industrial past, and jazz and rock 'n' roll heritage, we explore great music that provides the soundtrack to Cleveland's story. Conductor Daniel Meyer introduces each piece and explains its connection to the Cleveland landmark, institution or resource being celebrated.

This story is represented through traditional Chinese shadow puppetry, accompanied by arrangements of Chinese folk music performed by string quartet, featuring Mimi Jong on erhu, a traditional Chinese stringed instrument. The Cleveland Jazz Orchestra has been Northeast Ohio's premier jazz voice since 1985. Led by award-winning composer and trombonist Paul Ferguson, the CJO promotes jazz in its historical and contemporary forms, through concerts featuring a stellar line-up of jazz luminaries, arrangers, composers, and educators. At a CJO concert, you will enjoy "the best jazz you've ever heard and the best jazz you've never heard." Through inventive, original music and effective, innovative Educational Outreach, the CJO shepherds young and up-and-coming musicians and provides our region with unique and important cultural experiences.

The CJO presents a variety of programs to nurture the region's neophyte jazz musicians and listeners. Most of CJO's performers are also educators who work regularly with collegiate groups (Kent State University, Cleveland State University, Youngstown State University, Case Western Reserve University, Ashland University, The University of Akron, The Ohio State University and Cuyahoga Community College) and younger students in Cleveland Heights, Garfield Heights, Cleveland and Hawkin, at local music stores, via Jupiter Wind Instruments and the Selmer-Bach Corporation. Each year, the Cleveland Jazz Orchestra's Educational Outreach programs continue to expand to impactfully address the needs of students in Grades 5-12. These programs include:

1) Residencies: Traditionally, jazz education has focused exclusively on High School instrumentalists even though attrition rates during the Middle School span are only surpassed by the initial months of instrumental instruction. Over the last three years, CJO residencies have expanded from 7-weeks in the pilot year in 4 CMSD Middle Schools to a year-long program. Instruction is tailored to the individual schools and collaborating teacher's backgrounds. CJO has, and can assist in creating or reviving instrumental music programs decimated by the pandemic. With collaborating teachers, CJO provides students with a jazz pedagogy unlike anything elsewhere. CJO looks to expand this instruction to other CMSD and Northeast Ohio schools..

• For Grades 6-12 with 3-4 CJO musicians per week - 1 hour per day, 1 time per week year-long, with several concerts involving students performing with CJO instructors. Residency offerings include:

a) musicianship master classes, jazz/improvisation/scatting with CJO musicians (1hr each, multiple musicians on multiple instruments)

b) bite sized exercises/activities on instruments (5-10 minutes each)

2. Guest artist/Clinician/Adjudication: (time varies as per need). The CJO provides support funding to help enable CJO artists to provide these experiences to schools.

3. Side by Side events: In this initiative, the entire CJO rehearses with and then performs a concert onstage with a school ensemble (time varies as per need).

4. Free stuff/content: The CJO YouTube.com channel contains a number of free, educational instructional videos that are useful for musicians of all ages. The CJO conducts all of their rehearsals at NEO schools with students in

attendance, and free tickets and 'field trip' experiences are often provided to schools for CJO's Season Series concerts.

The Music Settlement

The Music Settlement (TMS) is a centuries-old community music school forged out of the Settlement Movement as a way to welcome immigrants to Cleveland and unite them through the common language of music. Since its founding in 1912, it has grown from a foundation of music instruction to offer early childhood education and music therapy services. In 2018, a second campus was developed in the Ohio City neighborhood to connect Cleveland's east and west sides.

Blues and African American Songwriting

<u>Students in grades 3 to 12</u> will work with directly with a teaching artist to explore culturally significant blues and traditional African American music styles. They will learn about the parent styles of traditional music, and how they influenced modern popular music. The residency will be tailored and grouped to be age and skill appropriate to the grade level selected. - Students will learn musical form, style, and differences in genres, while creating original lyrics and melodies. The program will culminate in an assembly presentation where students will perform their original works backed up by a band of professional musicians.



This class is designed to educate students from 5th to 12th grade, highlighting the musical revolution created by hiphop, answering questions such as:

• How and why did hip-hop begin?

- How did hip-hop artists innovate new technology and create new sounds and musical structures?
- What are some of the lyrical messages in early hip-hop?

"Play It Loud!: The Musical Instruments of Rock & Roll"

This class is designed to educate students from Kindergarten to 5th grade on musical instruments and how they create the unique sounds of rock & roll, including:

- What are the instrument families of rock & roll?
- How do different instruments contribute to the sound of a rock & roll song?
- How do musicians work as a team to play songs together?

Additionally, group chaperones and leaders can use self-guided activities and resources on their mobile devices, including invitations to investigate specific exhibits and artifacts followed by guiding questions that ask students to reflect on what they observe. Guiding questions are also available for immersive experiences like The Garage and the Power of Rock, making these an exciting part of the students' day.

Education is a core aspect of Cleveland Public Theatre's mission. We believe art can change lives and that everyone is an artist! Throughout our history, we have offered unique education programs that celebrate the artist within all of us. Based on CPT's guiding education principles of Empowerment, Equity, Excellence, and Enthusiasm, CPT's Teaching Artists work to build close, long-term relationships with participants, families, and community partners by facilitating trust and open exchange. Our education programming seeks to create, for participants and teachers alike, a reciprocal collaborative learning environment that supports awareness and fosters powerful and life-affirming art experiences.

Core Education Programs

• Cleveland Act Now (CAN) offers year-round theatre arts training for young artists through two programs: CMHA CAN, in partnership with Cuyahoga Metropolitan Housing Authority (CMHA), provides performing arts programming for youth ages 6-14 who live in public housing. Sessions are held in their neighborhood community centers.

CAN Academy is a free theatre training program at Cleveland Public Theatre for youth ages 7-14 from Cleveland and surrounding neighborhoods.

• Student Theatre Enrichment Program (STEP) is a rigorous arts-based program that provides compensated hands-on job training, engages youth from Cleveland families in a powerful learning experience that develops job skills, academic achievement, and interpersonal skills. As part of this eight-week summer program, youth ages 14-19 work together to create, produce, perform, and tour their own play. This program is the longest running arts-based,

workplace development program in Cleveland and is an international model for engaging youth. Since its beginning in 1994, STEP has received multiple awards and recognitions including those from the City of Cleveland, The President's Committee on the Arts and the Humanities, and the National Endowment for the Arts. Through STEP, teens see themselves as a positive and inspirational force, and watch as their work has an impact on the larger Cleveland community

• Y-Haven Theatre Project is a theatre program for residents of Y-Haven, a transitional housing facility for formerly homeless men and women in recovery from drug and alcohol addiction and mental health challenges. Participants learn performance and technical theatre skills to create an original play based on their life experiences, affirming their recovery and raising awareness around addiction and homelessness.

CIFF's Educational Programs: Grades 5 - 12



FilmSlam® Streams is CIFF's virtual media literacy program that allows educators to stream films directly in the classroom with their students. Through film, students in grades 5-12 are introduced to other cultures and foster awareness of people different from themselves. Educators can select from free plans to paid subscription-based plans that include study guides with an introduction to media literacy, curriculum links, discussion topics, post-screening activities and resources. Filmmaker and other presenters participate in virtual Q&As following films. CMSD, Akron Public Schools, and other qualifying public schools receive **free** access.

Each monthly installment includes narrative and documentary short films in Arabic, Chinese, English, French, German, Spanish, and Ukrainian languages. 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• Eyeball It!®

Eyeball It!® is a totally free, hands-on studio ART program for 7-13 year-olds available online. It can be guided DIY by any adult with children. All you need is Internet access (public or private), some art materials and a place to work. Eyeball It!® adds an essential 'A' (Art) to help transform 'STEM' education (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) into comprehensive 'STEAM' education. High-quality studio art projects foster the creative thinking and problem-solving essential for innovation!

Projects are multi-session (usually 3-5) and cover painting, drawing, sculpture, collage, clay and color in varying combinations. Projects and their Lesson Plans can be printed or downloaded. Instructional Videos and Read-Alongs must be viewed from the website by computer or cellphone browser.

With each of the Eyeball It!® Projects and Drawing Exercises, there is a Read-Along recording. These play as little movies with the PDF text appearing as it does in the Projects. Their purpose is to help children read comfortably and with good comprehension, and to make these Projects easier for parents, teachers, other adults and kids to manage.

One example: **Project #2: Relief Collage** guides children through constructing a large, abstract collage of 3D shapes on a 2D background from cut, bent and folded paper. The resulting collage can be painted and colored. In our virtual, screen-dominated world, this project helps children understand physical 3-dimensionality and builds the mental 'muscle-tone' needed to begin imagining and constructing 3D art. There are many other Projects. Check them out.

The Morgan pursues its educational and charitable purposes by serving the greater community locally, nationally and internationally with sustainable practices in an innovative green environment. The Morgan Conservatory is a working studio, gallery, gathering place for the community, educational hub and purveyor of some of the finest handmade papers in the world and a unique kozo garden was installed to grow fiber for specialized papers.

The Morgan Conservatory offers both on and off-site programming for organizations, clubs, schools and groups of artists. Each workshop is tailored to meet the artistic needs of the group and can run anywhere from one hour to a week in length. Prices vary depending on the number of participants, the amount of time the program runs and what disciplines are taught.

DANCECleveland embraces, educates, inspires, and supports dance by maintaining our core values of nurturing the human spirit, expanding aesthetic experiences in our community, and stimulating fun, joy, and passion.

Read to Learn...Dance to Move is a Literacy and Movement Program for Preschool and Kindergarten Students. It is a curriculum-based program that promotes language, literacy, and movement by engaging students through tactile learning, creative thinking, and imagination. The program was developed with an early childhood specialist, is rooted in State of Ohio educational standards, and incorporates Ohio Kindergarten Common Core Learning Standards for English Language Arts and Ohio Kindergarten Dance Standards.

Each class lasts 45 minutes and the program consists of eight classes. The classes can be offered in the classroom, in a virtual format delivered to participants through a digital meeting platform such as Zoom, or via a series of prerecorded videos provided to participants for on-demand use. Throughout eight classes, children are introduced to six forms of dance (Ballet, Tap, Jazz, African, Modern, and Hip-Hop). Each class incorporates a children's book about a style of dance through guided discussion and open-ended questions that help students identify key elements of the story and the dance forms. Children experience guided experimentation with each dance form, then the instructor leads the children to create a dance and encourages individual creative expression as students retell the story. Finally, students perform the new dance of their own creation. This program has been featured at past Early Childhood Professional Development conferences and has been in the CMSD schools for more than 10 years with measurable success.

Cost: Cost varies based on delivery method and level (Pre-K or K program). Please contact DANCECleveland directly for pricing.

Time: 8 sessions total, twice a week for 4 weeks or once a week for 8 weeks.

Grades: Specific curriculum developed for both Pre-K and Kindergarten classes.

Pre-K and Kindergarten

"At my BEST" - Movement activities are designed with Body shapes, movement qualities and Energy, awareness in Space and Time and creative exploration. In addition to our movement activities we will also create a costume piece and a hand-held prop to support our theme and include in our culminating event. Academic connections are examined through the art of movement and nurture physical, social and emotional development.

Grade 1 and 2 — "Dance of Life- Water and Light" science

Solar energy and water on Earth: An Arts-Integrated Residency.

This theme focuses on helping students develop the skills for systematic discovery to understand the science of the natural world around them. We undertake our study with the whole- bodily awareness of dance, the art of movement. We will learn a routine of movement exercises that we will grow each class to develop movement fundamentals. We then integrate academic concepts with movement investigations and expressions to create our dance.

Energy is observed through movement, heating, cooling and the needs of living organisms.

The sun is the principal source of energy. Water on Earth is present in many forms and the Properties of objects and materials can change.

Grade 3 — "Dancing with Worms" engages student learning through multiple intelligences. Teaching the arts and science together informs and advances student understanding, appeal, and the value of the subjects. The creative process is fun, engages learning and builds self-esteem.

The activities are assembled to create a final show of our artwork to share with the community.

"Dancing with Worms" focuses on:

- Properties of solids, liquids, and gases.
- The presence of and role that air, water, and organic matter play in soil.
- Interaction of living and non-living things in soil represented by worms aiding in composting of organic matter.

Grade 4 — "Geometry and Dance" - Mr. Tom, "The Dance Man", leads lessons that integrate the study of Geometry (math) with creative movement: the art of dance. The human body relates to geometry in that our bones create lines and our joints create angles. With the discipline of full-body movement activities from sitting on the floor to standing as students find creative expression for the academic standards of lines and angles. A greater understanding of 2-dimentional shapes is realized through "stretchy bands" with which students create triangles and guadrilaterals. The connections are so strong between the body moving through space and how we measure it in geometry that it creates clear learning opportunities and test scores soar. Our residency culminates with sharing of our work with the school community.



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Dancing Classrooms Northeast Ohio

"Dancing Classrooms" is a 10-week – 20 session social development program for 5th and 8th grade children that utilizes ballroom dancing as a vehicle to change the lives of not only the children who participate in the program but also the lives of the teachers and parents who support these children. Dancing Classrooms is not about teaching ballroom dancing. The dance is a tool for getting the children to break down social barriers, learn about honor and respect, treat others carefully, improve self-confidence, communicate, cooperate, and accept others even if they are different.

GroundWorks DanceTheater is a contemporary dance company that has been committed to enriching the Northeast Ohio community through performance, collaboration, and education for the past 25 years. Community impact is a central focus of the company's work, and through our diverse education programs and performances GroundWorks serves more than 8,000 individuals annually. The commonalities among Groundworks core programs – dance performance, dance instruction, and creative movement-based education – are connection and creativity. Education programs bring the community into direct contact with the company's professional dancers and teaching artists in a collaborative, participant-centered environment. Over the past twenty years, GroundWorks' trauma informed care, commitment to social-emotional learning, and culturally responsive approach to education has earned us a reputation as a presenter of high-quality educational programming.

<u>Action/Reaction</u> (adults of all ages) introduces contemporary dance to individuals who are involved with creative practices in other arts disciplines. The program works to create meaningful interplay across the boundaries of various art forms, encouraging new understandings and creative perspectives across disciplines. Prior dance/movement experience is not required.

<u>dance PROject</u> (middle and high school students) is a customizable residency program providing quality contemporary dance training and education for students with dance training or experience. It can range from a minimum of three classes to a two week residency to setting a piece of GroundWorks repertory on students. This program brings students together with professional dance artists and educators for a unique personalized learning experience. The company also designs individualized dance workshops and residencies for students in colleges/universities and dance studios.

exCHANGE (Pre K-12) introduces students to the worlds of creative movement, contemporary dance, and kinesthetic learning. Sessions are designed to meet each class need and to engage and support students' curiosity, creativity, communication, trust, and respect. Students have a shared presentation experience with the company dancers and gain insight into dance production as well.

Kinection for Learning (Pre K-12) is a long-term residency program designed to support and enhance classroom learning through creative movement and kinesthetic learning. • **The Carnival of the Animals** — Richard Dickinson's Carnival of the Animals is a 30-minute ballet that takes on the subject of bullying and its effect and consequences on individuals and peer groups using the music of Camille Saint-Saens. 

• Cleveland History Center (headquarters for Western Reserve Historical Society)

Founded in May 1867, the Western Reserve Historical Society (WRHS) is Cleveland's oldest existing cultural institution. Today, WRHS is based at the Cleveland History Center in University Circle, and includes other historic properties throughout Northeast Ohio, most notably Hale Farm & Village.

The Cleveland History Center (CHC) includes the permanent exhibit Cleveland Starts Here®, sponsored by the Jack, Joseph, and Morton Mandel Foundation, as well as the Euclid Beach Park Grand Carousel, the WRHS Research Library, the Crawford Auto-Aviation Museum, the Chisholm Halle Costume Wing, two historic mansions.

Youth Entrepreneurship Education (YEE) for grades 4-7

Students practice skills and strategies for starting their own business by studying innovative entrepreneurs and products from Cleveland history. YEE also asks students to consider the future – they closely examine museum artifacts and determine how they can innovate past products, including the cars and motorcycles on display, to meet the demands of today's markets. Each program is geared toward the standards and concepts for each grade.

Region 3 Ohio History Day – early March 2024 – for grades 6-12

Ohio History Day is a project-based learning experience for students in grades 6-12 that builds college and career skills for the 21st century by making the historical past relevant to the present and the future. To participate, students choose topics in relation to the yearly theme, conduct research, and present their findings as a **paper, exhibit**, **documentary, website, or performance.** In the process, students learn critical thinking skills through locating and evaluating primary and secondary sources, and they hone their creativity in building arguments and presenting their findings. Drum Circle - The drum is the first instrument in the world. It's the first thing you're introduced to echoing the beat of your mother's heart. Patting Juba - When drums were outlawed in the South, enslaved persons used their bodies as a drum. "Pattin' Juba", used in the Southern United States, became a lively dance with much clapping and thigh slapping. Students will learn basic rhythms through body percussion. Suitable for grades 2 and up.

reCREATE pARTicipate: Black Art Matters, The Underground Railroad, Math Concepts and Time, Sacajawea and The Louisiana Purchase, Forms of Government, Ancient Egypt and Mythology, or Centers of Commerce in Asia and Africa — Visual arts workshop in which students are guided to discuss, then creatively reCREATE art works reflecting social studies or math topics using every day materials found in the classroom. Topics suitable for grades 2-8. These workshops can be in person or virtual.

Quilt Codes: create secret coded maps of the Underground Railroad! - Just as Negro Spirituals contained hidden messages or secret codes during the Civil War, explore ways to create hidden messages with visual art design to create a coded, paper quilt map that could have helped enslaved persons find their way from Cleveland to Canada! Human Machines Through Japanese Puppets -Through the art of Japanese bunraku puppetry, students will work together to create a puppet then bring it to life, in order to act out a tale of perseverance and ingenuity. Become the puppet master of your own learning! Chalkboard or whiteboard required. Suitable for grades 3-12.

Yoga Tales - There is a belief that hundreds and hundreds of years ago, in India, all creatures lived in harmony with nature. People saw this and began imitating all things natural. As they did these movements, they found their bodies grew stronger and more flexible. This is Yoga, a way to use our minds, breath and bodies all at the same time bringing peace and happiness. 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• The Superhero Project

The Superhero Project is a nonprofit organization that empowers youth impacted by serious illnesses, disabilities, mental health challenges and trauma. Kids and teens are interviewed about who they are beyond their diagnosis and how they want to make a difference in the world. Each child is then matched with an artist who designs the superhero alter ego they describe, creating a visual representation of their strength, courage and resilience.

INSIDE THE CLASSROOM — **Touring Exhibits and Activities:** The Superhero Project has two free touring exhibits available for schools. Each exhibit features posters of original superheroes created by young people and designed by artists, as well as placards with framing essays, videos narrating the essays, character stories and an

interactive component where visitors can conceptualize their own superhero. Also available are educators' guides with discussion questions, extension activities (creative writing, art and other creative collaborative projects) and a scavenger hunt for exploring the exhibits. Appropriate for all ages.

- Look at Me: Recognition and Representation in a New Pantheon of Superheroes: This exhibit features superheroes designed by Black, Latinx, Native American, Asian American and Arab American youth. Artist activist Amanda D. King's moving essay connects the collection to principles of representational justice, reminding us that too often young people of color are missing from art and culture. When individuals are doubly marginalized by race and by illness or disabilities, seeing themselves reflected in joyful and powerful ways is even more critically important. Ideal for critical thinking discussions about images in popular culture, diversity and inclusion. [Up to 55 posters available]
- <u>The Superhero Project Celebrates #ADA30</u>: This exhibit commemorates the 30th anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act, which was passed in 1990. The ADA is a civil rights law that guarantees individuals with disabilities the same rights and opportunities as everyone else and prohibits discrimination against individuals with disabilities in all areas of public life. The Superhero Project Celebrates #ADA30 is a collection of posters created by youth with lifelong disabilities, both visible and invisible. Wheelchairs, AFOs, hearing aids and other adaptive equipment are proudly and joyfully included in these dynamic and diverse images. [30 posters]

The Power of The Superhero Project: Executive Director Lisa Kollins presents the story of The Superhero Project in a multi-media presentation, exploring the power of the arts as a tool for healing. The interactive workshop includes options for creative writing (developing short character stories for existing posters and/or writing letters to the youth featured in the posters which will be delivered to them), reflective thinking (a discussion about the qualities of superheroes and who in their lives embodies those positive characteristics), and imaginative design (guiding questions that help youth conceptualize their own superhero alter egos in words or pictures, focused on how they want to make a difference in the world and what powers/tools they'll need). [3rd-12th grade]

OUTSIDE THE CLASSROOM — Educators with students eligible for superheroes (living with serious illnesses and/or disabilities) may <u>refer families</u> to The Superhero Project. Interviews can also be scheduled for small classroom groups; parental permission and photographs of the children are required.



BUILD YOUR OWN XYLOPHONE AND OTHER INSTRUMENTS. Do you drive your teachers crazy at school by drumming on the desk with your pencils? Have you ever wanted to be a drummer or a musician? If so, this activity is for you.

WHAT YOU NEED

An adult to help Different lengths of PVC pipes

Two boards String A mallet or small hammer

WHAT YOU DO

- Create a xylophone by cutting PVC pipe into various lengths.
- Place them side by side on a frame from the longest to shortest.

• Cut two boards the appropriate length to accommodate all the pipes. These boards will make a good supporting frame. The best sound will be achieved by allowing a little less than a third of each pipe to extend off the frame.

• When you have the pipes the way that you want, tie them on the frame with string.

• You can tune your xylophone by cutting the pipes shorter for higher notes and leaving the pipes longer for the lower ones.

• Play the xylophone by striking the pipes with a mallet of some kind.
