Arts Impact brings learning to life through art. Our primary purpose is to use the arts to help children learn, create, imagine, dream, explore, grow, and succeed. Arts Impact offers its arts-integrated STEM and Social and Emotional Learning programs as well as arts enrichment.

• **STEAM Residencies:** Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math + Art — Arts Impact has a long history of working directly with classroom teachers with a variety of subjects to design a residency that follows the district's scope and sequence and meets curriculum standards in art and the specific subject area. • **Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) Residencies: SEL Topics Integrated with Art** — Arts Impact offers 8-session SEL Residencies that are standards-based and designed with topics and art projects relevant to specific grade levels.

1. **This is My Story** — A multi-session residency for 6th graders that focuses on self-awareness and explores the topics of personal strengths and identity, self-confidence, role models, personal values, worldview, core emotions, and emotion management
2. **This is Our Story** — A multi-session residency for 7th graders that focuses on self and others and explores the topics of friendship, inclusion and exclusion, understanding differences, empathy, community and connection, teamwork, problem-solving, bullying, and becoming an ally.
3. **This is My Future** — A multi-session residency for 8th graders that focuses on the power of mindsets, self-motivation and self-discipline, organization skills, creative visioning, setting goals, and creating a life plan.
4. **Identity: Life in Rhymes** — A multi-session hip-hop-based residency for 9th graders that uses poetry, music, and art to explore and express personal identity as it relates to the SEL competencies of Self-Awareness, Social-Awareness, Relationship Skills, and Responsible Decision Making.

• **Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) Programs: SEL Topics Integrated with Art** — SEL workshops can be developed for various grade levels and offered as individual workshops or classes. Contact us to explore topics and arts-integrated program options.

MISSION: To strengthen and support underprivileged communities by providing access to performing arts, visual arts, and arts education.

GOAL: To provide positive alternatives to negative behaviors by instilling discipline, self-pride and boosting self-confidence through self-expression and self-discovery.

• In-School Foluké Workshops and Residencies for Grades 2-12 include THEATER, DANCE, VISUAL ARTS, CULINARY ARTS: Theater training in monologue and presentation; Dance technique training and creative movement; Music training in rhythm as it pertains to drumming, and vocal call and response; Culinary Arts and Visual Arts electives such as Media arts, photography and film, in addition to graphic arts. One day workshops, and 6 to 10-week residencies are available. Fees range from \$400 to \$5,000.

About SMARTS — SMARTS, Students Motivated by the Arts, is a *free* community art school in downtown Youngstown that provides classes in visual art, music, dance, theater, and creative writing for PK-12 youth with a focus on underserved populations. Since 1997, SMARTS classes have been *free* and open to the public, and all students are accepted through a simple application process. SMARTS opportunities are available to students through:

Public Programming classes in-person after-school and on Saturday mornings at the SMARTS facility in the historic Ohio One Building in Youngstown and live online via Zoom through Virtual SMARTS; and

Community Programming, partnering with schools, school districts, and youth programs throughout the region both during and after school by providing them with arts classes, arts integration workshops, and hands-on activities for their students. In addition to our *free* public classes offered in the Fall, Spring, and Summer, SMARTS' Community Programming partnerships allow us to reach deep into the community, engage students who may not have any or enough access to the arts, and to generate revenue in support of our future. SMARTS hires and prepares community teaching artists with professional training and oversight so that they can provide quality arts-focused teaching and learning with lesson plans that follow state standards.

SMARTS maintains a national presence through our partnership with the **John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts' Any Given Child** initiative. As one of twenty-eight communities across the country, SMARTS partners with the Warren City School District and community leaders to provide access and equity in quality arts education for PK-8 students. SMARTS provides leadership for Any Given Child, Warren and acts as a liaison to the Kennedy Center while focusing on arts integration for students and professional development for teachers. Fairy tales include “Goldilocks and the Three Bears” and poetry includes verses from “Winnie the Pooh” by A.A. Milne. This program can range in time from 20 – 40 minutes and should take place in an intimate setting. Recommended for ages Pre-K – 2nd grade, this program is fun for adults as well as children.

Team Up with Music© (Grade 3-5) illustrates the fundamentals of teamwork and sharing while creating an appreciation of the artists, their instruments and their music. Recommended for grades 3 – 5, “Team Up with Music”

can take place in a classroom, cafeteria, library, gymnasium, choir room, or any facility that will accommodate closeness of audience to the performers.

Outside The Box (Grade 6-12) programs are designed specifically for middle and high school age audiences. This highly interactive program provides students with the opportunity to respond and dialogue with members of the quartet on a wide variety of subjects relating to music including interpretation, compositional techniques, career development, social and historical context, and rehearsal techniques. These programs are best for audiences of 100 or less, and work well in an intimate setting i.e., choir, orchestra, band room or library. Great for non-music or music classes alike.

The Art of Listening (grade 6-12) develops imaginative new ways of listening to music by engaging the active participation of the listener's other senses and perceptions. Using references to the visual arts and other disciplines, the program invites the audience to share its responses to different selections of music. The program is an ideal experience for young people from middle school through high school and is especially appealing to family audiences.

CityMusic Cleveland is a professional chamber orchestra that performs free concerts throughout Northeast Ohio. Since exploding onto the scene in 2004, CityMusic Cleveland has won cheering audiences with beautiful music, brilliantly performed in familiar neighborhood settings. FREE concerts make CityMusic accessible to everyone!

CityMusic teaching artists provide free, high-quality music education experiences to K-4 students in underserved Cleveland schools and communities. These interactive programs tell diverse cultural stories through music, theater, and dance, broadening the lenses through which students experience music and the arts. Each program features professional musicians, dynamic storytelling, and comprehensive curriculum materials for classroom teachers.

2025/2026:

Immigrants feature the music of Erich Korngold, Sergei Rachmaninoff and Igor Stravinsky, the reasons for their emigration to the US in the mid-20th century and their accomplishments as musicians/composers in the US. Using piano, clarinet and cello, *Immigrants* explores the historical circumstances that lead to their decision to emigrate and highlights their fame and effect on American culture.

Parallel Tracks contrasts the music of George Walker and John Coltrane with a focus on the difference between notated and improvised music, while celebrating the success and acclaim of two major black musicians. *Parallel Tracks* contrasts the lives and compositional practices of Walker and Coltrane by comparing *Lyric for Strings* and *A Love Supreme* — and look at the roots of string quartet music in European courts as background music for significant occasions, and the roots of jazz in call-and-response, and then contrast both forms at their evolutionary heights in the work of Walker and Coltrane.

These programs accomplish the following goals from the Ohio Learning Standards - Fine Arts: Music at a grade-appropriate level:

- Performing: Artists/students employ personal processes and skills to solve problems creatively and present work in various contexts.
- Responding: Artists/students engage in analysis and interpretation to understand and evaluate artistic works.
- Connecting: Artists/students understand and communicate the value of creative expressions in internal and external contexts.

CCGS provides exceptional teachers, curricula, guitars, and more at no cost to the students; while the students bring creativity, ambition, imagination, dedication and passion. CCGS works with schools that wish to provide in-depth learning experiences through classes that are twice a week in opt-in groups of 6-8 students each. Dedicated students can also get private lessons in school or at after-school sites.

CCGS students have gone on to Cleveland School of the Arts, Interlochen and Brevard summer camps, and fellowships with the Cleveland Institute of Music and Guitar Foundation of America. They have appeared on national and local news and performed at Cleveland’s most prestigious venues and events. Students were commissioned to write the theme music for the podcast series *The Asterisk**, from the Anisfield-Wolf Book Awards. A story produced by Cleveland Metropolitan School District on CCGS’s program won a 2021 regional Emmy. CCGS is one of six organizations in the Cleveland Foundation’s Arts Mastery Initiative.



The organization’s four major programs and events include the Cleveland International Piano Competition, the CIPC for Young Artists, the Concert Series, and year-round education and community programming.

Keys to Read (Gr 6-8):

A multi-period workshop for middle school students that combines hands-on musical experiences with literacy education. Students explore ELA concepts such as tone, literary devices, and writing composition while learning the basics of the keyboard and songwriting. By the end of the program, they use these skills to write and compose their own song, creatively integrating musical and literary elements.

Keys to Songwriting (Gr 6-8):

As a variation to Keys to Read, this program focuses on teaching students the fundamentals of songwriting through the keyboard. In this shortened workshop, students explore musical elements like melody, harmony, rhythm, and lyrics, and apply these skills to create their own original song by the end of the workshop. It's a hands-on, creative experience that empowers students to express themselves through music.

Piano ReACTIONS (Gr 3-6):

This program invites students to respond to live piano music through different art forms, such as drawing, dance, and creative writing. By using critical listening skills to interpret the music, students develop a deeper understanding and appreciation of musical expression. This process enhances their ability to think creatively and critically while fostering unique and personal connections to the music.

Musical Storytelling (K-2):

An interactive program for students where a narrator, supported by live keyboard music, brings each story to life. Through a blend of spoken words and dynamic melodies, the music sets the mood, highlights characters, and enhances the narrative. Students are encouraged to clap, sing, and even act out parts of the story, becoming co-creators of the musical adventure. This hands-on approach encourages creativity and makes each storytelling experience unique and engaging.

Musical Mysteries (K-3):

This engaging program combines fun, educational puzzles with interactive music activities. Students will work together to solve intriguing mysteries using clues hidden in melodies, rhythms, and musical concepts. • **Roots of American Music**

We nourish our neighborhoods with the transformative power of music through education and performance. We use live music to educate, inspire, and comfort people in settings where exposure to music performance is limited or non-existent (music deserts). We serve Northeast Ohio citizens in K-12 schools, residential communities serving seniors, and adult day communities serving the physically and developmentally challenged.

Stop the Hate: Youth Sing Out Program for 6-12th Grades – *Roots of American Music partners with the Maltz Museum's **Stop the Hate program** (also see information under Maltz Museum in this directory).*

The Stop the Hate Program offers FREE song workshops for 6-12 grade students. This program gives students a chance to rise from injustice and stand up and sing out for themselves and for others. The program is offered for five to eight, weekly, 50 minute in-class lessons during the classroom teacher's specified class time.

- Songwriting contests featuring grants and prizes

Blues is the Backbone for Kindergarten-Second Grade Students

Blues is the Backbone is an age-appropriate, cross curricular education program offered for kindergarten and second grade students reinforcing language arts, music, and social emotional learning standards. Through the exploration of blues musicians, history, and culture, the students will improve literacy skills, enhance music skills, and gain confidence through social emotional learning. Blues is the Backbone culminates with students writing lyrics to their own class song. This grant funded program is offered for six weekly, 50 minute in-class lessons during the classroom teacher's specified class time.

Montessori Schools

Roots of American Music provides teaching artists to grades 4 & 5 for 50-minute classes across 15 weeks during the classroom teacher's specified class time. Through music instruction with guitar or ukelele, students learn how to physically and vocally warm-up for singing, they sing as a group within an age-appropriate music history curriculum, create movement matching lyrics, and work in peer groups to learn key signatures, notes, and chords.

Elementary Music — Roots of American Music provides teaching artists to first, second and third grade students for 50-minute classes across 26 weeks during the classroom teacher's specified class time. Through music students will learn rhythm, circle dances, and games to enhance social and emotional learning, interaction with others, and connect physically through the sound and rhythm of music.

Live Music Performances

Music Deserts — Roots of American Music brings local musicians to neighborhoods and residents who lack live music opportunities. Through the transformative power of music, we share and educate about music rooted in America and help celebrate the sense of community. These programs can be scheduled as special- events, 30–60-minute performances, a 90-minute concert, or a concert series across days, weeks, or months.

Adult Day and Senior Residential Facilities — Roots of American Music brings local musicians to adult day and residential facilities for seniors, and facilities serving the physically and developmentally challenged. Through music we provide important mental, physical, and emotional benefits which help restore a sense of belonging, encourage physical movement through music interaction, and help individuals connect memories through music. These 50-minute programs can be regularly scheduled across the month and year for adult day and senior residential facilities.

Throughout our history, we have offered unique education programs that celebrate the artist within all of us. Based on CPT's guiding education principles of Empowerment, Equity, Excellence, and Enthusiasm, CPT's Teaching Artists work to build close, long-term relationships with participants, families, and community partners by facilitating trust and open exchange. Our education programming seeks to create, for participants and teachers alike, a reciprocal collaborative learning environment that supports awareness and fosters powerful and life-affirming art experiences.

Core Education Programs

• **Cleveland Act Now (CAN)** offers year-round theatre arts training for young artists through two programs.

CMHA CAN, in partnership with Cuyahoga Metropolitan Housing Authority (CMHA), provides performing arts programming for youth ages 6-14 who live in public housing. Sessions are held in their neighborhood community centers. <https://www.cptonline.org/cleveland-act-now/>

CAN Academy is a free theatre training program at Cleveland Public Theatre for youth ages 7-14 from Cleveland and surrounding neighborhoods.

- **Student Theatre Enrichment Program (STEP)** is a rigorous arts-based program that provides **compensated hands-on job training**, engages youth from Cleveland families in a powerful learning experience that develops job skills, academic achievement, and interpersonal skills. As part of this eight-week summer program, youth ages 14-19 work together to create, produce, perform, and tour their own play, in addition to providing paid training to young technical theatre artists. This program is the longest running arts-based, workplace development program in Cleveland and is an international model for engaging youth. Since its beginning in 1994, STEP has received multiple awards and recognitions including those from the City of Cleveland, The President's Committee on the Arts and the Humanities, and the National Endowment for the Arts. Through STEP, teens see themselves as a positive and inspirational force, and watch as their work has an impact on the larger Cleveland community.



Eyeball It!® is a totally free, hands-on studio ART program for 7–13-year-olds available online. It can be guided DIY by any adult with children. All you need is Internet access (public or private), some art materials and a place to work. Eyeball It!® adds an essential ‘A’ (Art) to help transform ‘STEM’ education (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) into comprehensive ‘STEAM’ education. High-quality studio art projects foster the creative thinking and problem-solving essential for innovation!

Projects are multi-session (usually 3-5) and cover painting, drawing, sculpture, collage, clay and color in varying combinations. Projects and their Lesson Plans can be printed or downloaded. Instructional Videos and Read-Alongs must be viewed from the website by computer or cellphone browser.

With each of the Eyeball It!® Projects and Drawing Exercises, there is a Read-Along recording. These play as little movies with the PDF text appearing as it does in the Projects. Their purpose is to help children read comfortably and with good comprehension, and to make these Projects easier for parents, teachers, other adults and kids to manage.

DANCECleveland aspires to be a national model for how a presenting organization serves its community, leveraging the world's best modern and contemporary dance to inspire and educate audiences, local dancers, and community members. In addition to presenting a series of world-class dance companies, DANCECleveland embodies our core belief that dance allows us to connect with, inspire, and build healthy, vibrant, and curious communities by bringing dance to Northeast Ohio through education and engagement programs for people of all ages.

Read to Learn...Dance to Move is a Literacy and Movement Program for preschool and kindergarten students. It is a curriculum-based program that promotes language, literacy, and movement by engaging students through tactile learning, creative thinking, and imagination. **The program was developed with an early childhood specialist, is rooted in State of Ohio educational standards, and incorporates Ohio Kindergarten Common Core Learning Standards for English Language Arts and Dance, and Early Learning and Development Standards for Language and Literacy, Creative Development, and Physical Education and Wellness.** Each class is 45 minutes in length, and the program consists of eight classes. The classes can be offered in the classroom, in a virtual format delivered to participants through a digital meeting platform such as Zoom, or via a series of prerecorded videos provided to participants for on-demand use.

Throughout eight classes, children are introduced to six forms of dance (Ballet, Tap, Jazz, African, Modern, and Hip-Hop). Each class incorporates a children's book about a style of dance followed by guided discussion and open-ended questions that help students identify key elements of the story and the dance forms. Children experience guided experimentation with each dance form, then the instructor leads the children to create a dance and encourages individual creative expression as students retell the story. Finally, students perform the new dance of their own creation.

This program has been featured at past early childhood professional development conferences and has been delivered in CMSD classrooms for more than 12 years with measurable success.

Dance Evert has shared in the pioneering efforts in the creation and delivery of Arts-Integrated Lesson design in the schools, which teach both academic and artistic content standards. Tom Evert has been credentialed as a National Master Teaching Artist from Young Audiences New York and serves on the roster of artists for the Ohio Arts Council and the Center for Arts-Inspired Learning.

Pre-K and Kindergarten

"At my BEST" – Movement activities are designed with **Body** shapes, movement qualities and **Energy**, awareness in **Space** and **Time** and creative exploration. In addition to our movement activities, we will also create a costume piece

and a hand-held prop to support our theme and include in our culminating event. Academic connections are examined through the art of movement and nurture physical, social and emotional development.

Grade 1 and 2 — “Dance of Life- Water and Light” science

Solar energy and water on Earth: An Arts-Integrated Residency.

This theme focuses on helping students develop the skills for systematic discovery to understand the science of the natural world around them. We undertake our study with the whole- bodily awareness of dance, the art of movement. We will learn a routine of movement exercises that we will grow each class to develop movement fundamentals. We then integrate academic concepts with movement investigations and expressions to create our dance. Energy is observed through movement, heating, cooling and the needs of living organisms. The sun is the principal source of energy. Water on Earth is present in many forms and the Properties of objects and materials can change.

Grade 3 — “Dancing with Worms” engages student learning through multiple intelligences. Teaching the arts and science together informs and advances student understanding, appeal, and the value of the subjects.

The creative process is fun, engages learning and builds self-esteem.

The activities are assembled to create a final show of our artwork to share with the community.

“Dancing with Worms” focuses on:

- Properties of solids, liquids, and gases.
- The presence of and role that air, water, and organic matter play in soil.
- Interaction of living and non-living things in soil represented by worms aiding in composting of organic matter.

Grade 4 — “Geometry and Dance” - Mr. Tom, “The Dance Man”, leads lessons that integrate the study of Geometry (math) with creative movement: the art of dance. The human body relates to geometry in that our bones create lines, and our joints create angles. With the discipline of full-body movement activities from sitting on the floor to standing as students find creative expression for the academic standards of lines and angles. A greater understanding of 2-dimensional shapes is realized through “stretchy bands” with which students create triangles and quadrilaterals. The connections are so strong between the body moving through space and how we measure it in geometry that it creates clear learning opportunities and test scores soar. Our residency culminates with sharing of our work with the school community.

• Cleveland History Center (headquarters for Western Reserve Historical Society)

Founded in May 1867, the Western Reserve Historical Society (WRHS) is Cleveland's oldest existing cultural institution. Today, WRHS is based at the Cleveland History Center in University Circle, and includes other historic properties throughout Northeast Ohio, most notably Hale Farm & Village.

The Cleveland History Center (CHC) includes the permanent exhibit Cleveland Starts Here®, sponsored by the Jack, Joseph, and Morton Mandel Foundation, as well as the Euclid Beach Park Grand Carousel, the WRHS Research Library (closed for renovations), the Crawford Auto-Aviation Museum, the Chisholm Halle Costume Wing, two historic mansions.

Youth Entrepreneurship Education (YEE) for grades 4-7

Students practice skills and strategies for starting their own business by studying innovative entrepreneurs and products from Cleveland history. YEE also asks students to consider the future – they closely examine museum artifacts and determine how they can innovate past products, including the cars and motorcycles on display, to meet the demands of today’s markets. Established in 2001 by the Cleveland Foundation, Neighborhood Connections is a nationally recognized community-building program. Its mission is to fuel the power of neighbors to create, together, an extraordinary world right where they live. Its small grants program is the largest in the country and is guided by a grantmaking committee of Cleveland and East Cleveland residents that reviews and approves all grants.

Neighbor Up - started in 2012 with a small group of 25 people. It emerged from the pain and isolation many of us were feeling. A small group of neighbors and the Neighborhood Connections staff got together and had conversations about what could be done differently to better our community. • The Superhero Project

The Superhero Project is a nonprofit organization that empowers youth impacted by serious illnesses, disabilities, mental health challenges and trauma. Kids and teens are interviewed about who they are beyond their diagnosis and how they want to make a difference in the world. Each child is then matched with an artist who designs the superhero alter ego they describe, creating a visual representation of their strength, courage and resilience.

INSIDE THE CLASSROOM — Touring Exhibits and Activities: The Superhero Project has two touring exhibits available for schools. Each exhibit features posters of original superheroes created by young people and designed by artists, as well as placards with framing essays, videos narrating the essays, character stories and an interactive

component where visitors can conceptualize their own superhero. Also available are educators' guides with discussion questions, extension activities (creative writing, art and other creative collaborative projects) and a scavenger hunt for exploring the exhibits. Appropriate for all ages.

- **Look at Me: Recognition and Representation in a New Pantheon of Superheroes:** This exhibit features superheroes designed by Black, Latinx, Native American, Asian American and Arab American youth. Artist activist Amanda D. King's moving essay connects the collection to principles of representational justice, reminding us that too often young people of color are missing from art and culture. When individuals are doubly marginalized by race and by illness or disabilities, seeing themselves reflected in joyful and powerful ways is even more critically important. Ideal for critical thinking discussions about images in popular culture, diversity and inclusion. [Up to 55 posters available]
- **The Superhero Project Celebrates #ADA30:** This exhibit commemorates the 30th anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act, which was passed in 1990. The ADA is a civil rights law that guarantees individuals with disabilities the same rights and opportunities as everyone else and prohibits discrimination against individuals with disabilities in all areas of public life. The Superhero Project Celebrates #ADA30 is a collection of posters created by youth with lifelong disabilities, both visible and invisible. Wheelchairs, AFOs, hearing aids and other adaptive equipment are proudly and joyfully included in these dynamic and diverse images. [30 posters]

The Power of The Superhero Project: Executive Director Lisa Kollins presents the story of The Superhero Project in a multi-media presentation, exploring the power of the arts as a tool for healing. The interactive workshop includes options for creative writing (developing short character stories for existing posters and/or writing letters to the youth featured in the posters which will be delivered to them), reflective thinking (a discussion about the qualities of superheroes and who in their lives embodies those positive characteristics), and imaginative design (guiding questions that help youth conceptualize their own superhero alter egos in words or pictures, focused on how they want to make a difference in the world and what powers/tools they'll need). [3rd-12th grade]

OUTSIDE THE CLASSROOM — Educators with students eligible for superheroes (living with serious illnesses and/or disabilities) may [refer families](#) to The Superhero Project. Interviews can also be scheduled for small classroom groups; parental permission and photographs of the children are required.

BUILD YOUR OWN XYLOPHONE AND OTHER INSTRUMENTS. Do you drive your teachers crazy at school by drumming on the desk with your pencils? Have you ever wanted to be a drummer or a musician? If so, this activity is for you.

WHAT YOU NEED

An adult to help

Different lengths of PVC pipes Two boards String A mallet or small hammer

WHAT YOU DO


- Create a xylophone by cutting PVC pipe into various lengths.
- Place them side by side on a frame from the longest to shortest.
- Cut two boards the appropriate length to accommodate all the pipes. These boards will make a good supporting frame. The best sound will be achieved by allowing a little less than a third of each pipe to extend off the frame.
- When you have the pipes the way that you want, tie them on the frame with string.
- You can tune your xylophone by cutting the pipes shorter for higher notes and leaving the pipes longer for the lower ones.
- Play the xylophone by striking the pipes with a mallet of some kind.
